our town. Together with our doctors we pack most essential medicine and organize "clinic on wheels". Local church buildings serve us as hospitals, and local pastors as translators. This year, in three clinics we were able to help more than 1000 patients, among these were babies and old men and women. As well as medical help we were able to evangelize to these people and pray for them... We are grateful to God for the opportunity to serve the people of Pocot and the bring the Living Word to them about salvation through Jesus Christ.

Every winter, together with our guests from the States, we make traveling clinics in the Pocot region. Pocot is a tribe of friendly and peaceful people. They are very hospitable and are not attracted to the belongings of others. Also they have many different traditions and interesting ways of life. However, they live far away from all civilization, thus many benefits of it, such as hospitals and clinics are inaccessible.

Many of these people don't even know what they are sick with, more so they do not have access to any medicine or treatment. Because of this, we travel to these remote villages, distance of 4-5 hour drive from
